Purpose

Todays Objective: Secure City Council approval for the solar pre-development agreement.

Why It Matters:

- Energy Redundancy
- Supports Kansas City's carbon reduction and renewable energy goals
- Boosts economic development and workforce training through sustainable energy projects



Overview of the Agreement

Partnership:

• Through partnership with the 816 Solar Consortium, Evergy will lease Kansas City International Airport property to construct and operate a solar array for an initial 30-year term with potential renewals

City's Role:

- Facilitate any eligible tax abatements and sales tax exemptions
- Collaborate on public communication and seek financial incentives
- No direct financial responsibility for the project

816 Solar Consortium's Role

• Fully fund, design, build, and maintain the solar array





Key Features of the Project

Renewable Energy Production:

• Solar array generating up to 500 MW of zero-carbon energy

Economic Impact:

- Creation of construction jobs and support for local businesses
- Supply carbon-free, on-peak energy to the Kansas City region electrical grid

Workforce Development

• Includes prevailing wage and apprenticeship opportunities for skills in solar construction including earthwork, tracking system installation, panel installation, and electrical commissioning

MWBE Participation:

• Project adheres to Kansas City's standard MWBE workforce requirements





Project Timeline

Design and Feasibility (2025-2026)

• Complete 10% design package and apply for interconnection with the Southwest Power Pool

Construction Start (2026-2028)

• Anticipated to begin following design approvals and interconnection agreements

World Cup Deadline (May 2026)

• Visible demonstration project for KCI travelers



Cost and Financing

Cost Responsibility

• Entirely funded by the 816 Consortium, including design, construction, and maintenance

City's Contribution

• Support through tax abatements

Energy Rates

• Impact to energy rates will be determined based on actual costs and approved by the Missouri Public Service Commission





Addressing Challenges

Regulatory Approval

- Missouri Public Service Commission will approve Evergy and the consortium's construction of the project
- Interconnection with the Southwest Power Pool may cause delays



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Next Steps

- Lease negotiations continue. KCAD will be back to present the Lease to TIO & Council for approval in first quarter 2025.
- Develop **10% design** in preparation for SPP application
- Apply to **SPP** for electrical grid interconnection
- Apply to state/federal grants
- **Begin detailed design** in support of construction and tax abetments and sales tax exemptions
