





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Ms. Reinhardt,

I was directed to email you by Mr. Rogers' office regarding my concerns over data centers being built in the Northland. I see that you are on the team behind the KC Spirit Playbook, and I believe you are seeking public comment on large format uses, which include data centers, in upcoming meetings.

I'm a Platte County resident and am looking to voice major concerns I have over data centers, especially because so many are being built in the Kansas City area. I live in the Northland, and we have the new Meta data center near Smithville, an almost-finished Google data center near Worlds of Fun, and two more data centers in the worlds — one near the airport and one across from the Meta data center.

I am highly concerned about the environmental impacts of these data centers, as well as the economic impact they will have on local residents. Port KC's press release about Project Mica, the new I-435/169 data center, says it will use 700 MW of power — which, by my estimates, is nearly two-thirds of Kansas City's peak usage. Data centers of this size also use one to five millions of gallons of water a day. If we continue saying yes to these tech companies, we are at a major risk of supply and demand issues for our most basic utility resources, and I fear that Kansas Citians will bear the brunt of the cost. Just this September, Ameren shut off power to 15,000 rate payers — what happens when our power grid is further filled up with data centers?

I have many thoughts on how Kansas City can add regulation around data centers. If my research is correct, I see that the KCI Logistics data center near the airport is being zoned in their MPD as "communications service establishment," which I fear does not adequately address the massive impact it has on energy usage, as well as noise. I think Kansas City needs a new category for data centers.

I also want to see further checks and balances when tech companies promise to use "renewable energy" and "replace water resources." I fear many of these promises will be unfulfilled, and I feel that our city is being bought off by tax revenue to our schools. I'm not sure if this could be achieved by planning and zoning.

I have seen other cities place a one-year moratorium on data center construction, such as in St. Charles, Missouri, and I think this may be an avenue to consider, given the huge impact these data centers have on our communities and the questions that have been unanswered surrounding them.


