\$30 million, five-year initiative
aimed at reducing violence and
improving public safety.

Focused on neighborhood strategies, youth development, and community restoration, with an emphasis on collaboration and resident engagement.

City's commitment to a
comprehensive approach that
combines community
involvement, support for at-risk
individuals, and creating a safer
environment.

2024 Strong Program Goals & Results

Goal: Engage neighborhoods from all KCMO council districts, prioritizing neighborhoods that experience high rates of crime

Result: CCF

Goal: Successful execution of projects in all neighborhoods

Result: 18 neiahborhoods participated in the pilot year of this program. 100% of neighborhoods successfully executed their projects. Neighborhoods collectively organized 76 events servicing over 3,500 residents. Source: Kotlaia et al., 2024, Violence Prevention Fund Annual Report

Goal: Build neighborhood capacity to create a healthier and safer neighborhood

Result:

- All 36 participants (2 from each neighborhood) were trained in designing Community Prevention projects, Mental Health First Aid, and Trauma-Sensitivity Training
- •83% of neighborhood leaders stated that program content deepened their knowledge and/or resources for neighborhood work.
- 100% of neighborhoods held events and/or programming that distributed violence prevention resources to residents



\$167,629.06 was distributed to Neighborhoods for programming

Types of Community Impact

Events included:

Community building: Family Fun Days, holiday parties, neighborhood celebrations

Safety initiatives: Crime prevention workshops, collaboration with KCPD

Civic engagement: Neighborhood meetings, interpretation services for non-English speakers

Youth development: Leadership programs, coding/cooking classes

Community improvement: Clean-up activities, home repair assistance fairs



2025 Program Goals & Strategy



Goal: Increase the number of participating neighborhoods in the program



Strategy: CCF began recruitment in late 2024 for the 2025 cohort. We expanded outreach and streamlined the application process to make it more accessible to neighborhoods citywide, with targeted promotion in districts not previously or under-represented.



Goal: Provide more resources and training support to equip neighborhoods with tools to advance violence prevention



Strategy: Engage additional expert facilitators and increase technical assistance opportunities to help neighborhoods design and complete impactful violence prevention projects.



Goal: Increase the sustainability and visibility of neighborhood-led violence prevention efforts




Strategy: Help neighborhoods document outcomes, pursue additional funding opportunities, and share their stories through events, digital platforms, and earned media.



2025 Budget Highlights

 83% of program budget is allocated directly to cash investments to neighborhoods

This does not include CCF's \$100,000 match commitment in neighborhood subgrant funds across the program duration. Therefore, increasing the City's total benefit while staying in budget.

2024 Impacts – Year One

Program Outputs

100% new clients entering unemployed

57% (53/93) as of 4/30/25

\$18.59 average wage (\$15-45/hour)

Food Pantry accessed 1,645 times

+25,000# of food! (January 2024-April 2025)

Less than 12% recidivism in first year

(March 2024 – April 2025)

- **✓ 1,273 Attendance in Cog Groups (1,556 Total)**
 - √ 80 of 93 (86.02%) participants engaged
 in at least one cog group
 - **✓** \$38,500 earned in stipends
- ✓ \$164,101.65 paid in vocational training and upskilling




