Executive Summary

Authorizing the acceptance of a \$656,925 grant from United States Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) Adult Treatment Court Program to implement a dedicated women's recovery pathway in the Kansas City Municipal problem-solving courts, designating requisitioning authority, and recognizing an accelerated effective date.

Discussion

The Kansas City Municipal Drug Court is a comprehensive, rehabilitative program serving municipal court defendants in Kansas City, Missouri who have substance use disorder. With the requested enhancement funding, the problem-solving court will implement a dedicated women's recovery pathway, incorporating gender-responsive and trauma-informed approaches to better address the unique needs and risks of system-involved women.

Primary activities of this initiative will include screening and assessing all women referred to Drug Court using the Women's Risk Needs Assessment and and providing them with individual trauma therapy integrated with evidence-based treatment programs.

Yes the project included letters of support from the court's current treatment and service partners who work with with court involved women with substance use, mental health and coocurring disorders, recognizing the unique needs of this population.
